PASTORAL CARE

The pastoral care of our pupils permeates all aspects of school life and reflects our Catholic ethos.

In St Lawrence's we strive to provide a happy, safe and secure environment where children are free from physical and emotional harm. Children are encouraged to discuss their interests and voice their fears, confident that they will receive a sympathetic and supportive response.

In order to provide the best possible care, teachers, other staff, pupils and parents must work together, recognising and respecting the others' rights and responsibilities.

We recognise the important role that parents play in their children's education and parents are welcome to contact the school if they have any concerns. Parents are also encouraged to attend assemblies and other celebrations in school and are formally invited to discuss their children's educational progress each year.

Policies relating to Child Protection, Pastoral Care and Positive Behaviour are sent to all parents and all other policies are available to parents, on request.

Pastoral Care is regularly monitored at staff meetings.



CHILD PROTECTION

A primary responsibility of our school is to protect the pupils in our care from any form of abuse - neglect, physical abuse, sexual abuse or emotional abuse.

As part of the curriculum, children are helped to learn about the risks of abuse and how to recognise unwelcome behaviours in others. Children are

also helped to acquire the confidence and skills they need to keep themselves safe.

All staff members have been trained in Child Protection issues and have been given clear guidance on the necessary action to be taken where abuse or neglect of a child is suspected i.e. keeping written records of concerns and discussing them with the Designated Teacher.

All staff, coaches etc who work with children have been vetted in accordance with DENI regulations.

The Designated Teacher for Child Protection is Mrs A Gavin. The Deputy Designated Teachers for Child Protection are Mrs F Donnelly and Mrs M McKeagney. The designated Governors for Child Protection is Mrs Hilary Maguire and Mrs Siobhan Montague. Together with Mr Stephen Cassidy, chairman of the BOG, this makes up the Safeguarding Team of St Lawrence's.

If a teacher or member of ancillary staff suspects that a child is, or has been, abused that person is lawfully obliged to report the suspected abuse under the Northern Ireland Children's Order, 1995.

In reporting suspected abuse, school personnel must follow the procedures set out in the Department of Education Circulars 1999/19, 2003/13.

The Child Protection Policy is reviewed regularly.

The school uniform consists of:

<u>Girls</u>

Navy skirt, pinafore, trousers or plain leisure bottoms, blue polo shirt, school sweatshirt

Boys

Navy/black trousers/plain leisure bottoms, blue polo shirt, school sweatshirt.

ALL ITEMS OF CLOTHING MUST BE CLEARLY LABELLED WITH THE CHILD'S NAME. REMEMBER THAT PEN WILL WASH OFF.

Summer Uniform

In the summer term boys may wear navy shorts and girls may wear navy shorts or a blue and white striped/checked dress.

All children are expected to adhere to the school rules regarding uniform and parental support and co-operation are essential in this area.

Induction for Nursery & Year 1

In April/May each year, parents are informed of the outcome of their applications for admission to Nursery and Year 1.

The Induction programme in St Lawrence's is intended to:

- help both parents and children in the transition from home to school
- ease the trauma of starting school especially for those children who have not attended Playgroup or Nursery

In June, children attending our Nursery, as well as prospective P.1. pupils who do not attend our Nursery, are introduced to their future classroom, their teacher and their classroom assistant in an informal manner. There is also an induction meeting held for Nursery and P.1. parents, which:

- gives parents the opportunity to discuss any worries or concerns they may have about their child starting school
- is an opportunity to give advice and guidance, if required, on how best to prepare children for school
- is an opportunity to ensure parents are familiar with school roles, rules and routines

CURRICULUM OVERVIEW

In St Lawrence's P.S. all children are encouraged and helped to achieve their full potential - academically, personally, socially and emotionally - in a safe, secure and religious environment. The statutory curriculum is enhanced and enriched through a wide range of learning experiences.

All teachers are required to follow the Northern Ireland Curriculum and must include:

- Language and Literacy
- Mathematics and Numeracy
- The World Around Us (Geography, History, Science and Technology)
- The Arts (Music, Art, Drama)
- Physical Education (PE)
- Personal Development and Mutual Understanding

While working through these areas teachers must also encourage the children's Thinking Skills and Personal Capabilities.

Teachers work from guidance given by DENI and from policies and Schemes of Work drawn up in school by the teachers themselves. This ensures continuity and progression from Year 1
